
Color Farm. Ehlert, Lois. (And others by this author)

To find out, just follow the tiny tour guide as he inches his way through the pages of this book. You'll see ants and bees and birds—hip-hopping bunnies too. You'll even hear the sounds some of them make. Crunch, munch, caterpillars lunch . . . Crack, snap, wings flap . . . Beginning as the sun is high in the sky and ending as fireflies blink and the moon rises above, this backyard tour is one no child will want to miss.




Farming. Gibbons, Gail. (And others by this author)

Waiting. Henkes, Kevin. (And others by this author)

Five friends sit happily on a windowsill, waiting for something amazing to happen. The owl is waiting for the moon. The pig is waiting for the rain. The bear is waiting for the wind. The puppy is waiting for the snow. And the rabbit is just looking out the window because he likes to wait! What will happen? Will patience win in the end? Or someday will the friends stop waiting and do something unexpected?



How to Catch a Star! Jeffers, Oliver. (And others by this author)

Once there was a boy, and that boy loved stars very much. So much so that he decided to catch one of his very own. But how? Waiting for them to grow tired from being up in the sky all night doesn't work. Climbing to the top of the tallest tree? No, not tall enough. The boy has a rocket ship . . . but it is made of paper and doesn't fly well at all. Finally, just when the boy is ready to give up, he learns that sometimes things aren't where, or what, we expect them to be.



Whistle for Willie. Keats, Ezra Jack. (And others by this author)

In the heat of a city summer, young Peter, an African American child, wishes to be able to whistle for his dog. Keats's illustrations boldly, colorfully capture the child, his city world, and the shimmering heat of a summer's day.



A Big Mooncake for Little Star. Lin, Grace.

Little Star loves the delicious Mooncake that she bakes with her mama. But she's not supposed to eat any yet! What happens when she can't resist a nibble? In this stunning picture book that shines as bright as the stars in the sky, Newbery Honor author Grace Lin creates a heartwarming original story that explains phases of the moon.




Inch by Inch. Lionni, Leo. (And others by this author)

This favorite classic picture book introduces children to a winning, winsome inchworm who can measure anything under the sun, from a robin's tail to a toucan's beak. When a hungry nightingale threatens to eat him for breakfast unless he can measure her song, the inchworm will have to cleverly solve the dilemma. This is a whimsical and sweet picture book that asks, "Can a song be measured?"



Mango, Abuela, and Me. Medina, Meg. (And others by this author)

Mia's *abuela* has left her sunny house with parrots and palm trees to live with Mia and her parents in the city. The night she arrives, Mia tries to share her favorite book with Abuela before they go to sleep and discovers that Abuela can't read the words inside. So while they cook, Mia helps Abuela learn English ("Dough. *Masa.*"), and Mia learns some Spanish too, but it's still hard for Abuela to learn the words she needs to tell Mia all her stories.



Niño Wrestles the World. Morales, Yuyi. (And others by this author)

Believing himself capable of fending off the most monstrous opponents, underpants-clad Lucha Libre champion Niño is challenged by a no-holds-barred wrestling match that truly tests his skills when his younger sisters wake up from their naps.



Beautiful Hands. Otoshi, Kathryn, and Baumgarten, Bret. (And others by these authors)

A celebration of the many things children can accomplish with their little hands is illustrated with artwork created using thumbprints and handprints.



The Family Book. Parr, Todd. (And others by this author)

The Family Book celebrates the love we feel for our families and all the different varieties they come in. Whether you have two moms or two dads, a big family or a small family, a clean family or a messy one, Todd Parr assures readers that no matter what kind of family you have, every family is special in its own unique way.



A Sick Day for Amos McGee. Stead, Philip C. (And others by this author)

Friends come in all sorts of shapes and sizes. In Amos McGee's case, all sorts of species, too! Every day he spends a little bit of time with each of his friends at the zoo, running races with the tortoise, keeping the shy penguin company, and even reading bedtime stories to the owl. But when Amos is too sick to make it to the zoo, his animal friends decide it's time they returned the favor.



Green Is a Chile Pepper: A Book of Colors. Thong, Roseanne Greenfield. (And others by this author)

In this lively picture book, children discover a world of colors all around them: red is spices and swirling skirts; yellow is masa, tortillas, and sweet corn cake. Many of the featured objects are Latino in origin, and all are universal in appeal. With rich, boisterous illustrations, a fun-to-read rhyming text, and an informative glossary, this playful concept book will reinforce the colors found in every child's day!



The Whale in My Swimming Pool. Wan, Joyce. (And others by this author)

One sunny day, a little boy heads outside for a swim, but his pool is already taken . . . there's a big whale in the water and it's not budging! The boy tries everything to get the whale to leave. Luckily, he comes up with the perfect solution: he decides to chill out on a spray of water over the whale's spout.

Knuffle Bunny. Willems, Mo. (And others by this author)

Trixie, Daddy, and Knuffle Bunny take a trip to the neighborhood laundromat. But the exciting adventure takes a dramatic turn when Trixie realizes somebunny was left behind. Using a combination of muted black-and-white photographs and expressive illustrations, this stunning book tells a brilliantly true-to-life tale about what happens when Daddy's in charge and things go terribly, hilariously wrong.


Pig loves books, both big and small, and reads them at school, at home, and on the bus.




Esperanza Rising. Ryan, Pam Muñoz.

Though rooted in history with evidence from many museums and research centers, *Byrd & Igloo* is exciting in tone, making it accessible and interesting for young readers.



The Last Fifth Grade of Emerson Elementary. Shovan, Laura. 256 pages


